# SPECIAL GUESTS




**DR. STEVE NOLT** is Director of the Young Center for Anabaptist and Pietist Studies and Professor of History at Elizabethtown College. He is a widely respected scholar of Mennonite and Amish history and contemporary life. Steve and his wife, Rachel, live in Lancaster, Pennsylvania.



**STEPHEN BOYKEN** is Lead Pastor of His House Ministries and President and Chief Executive Officer of The Hope Initiative, a faith-based nonprofit supporting long-term disaster recovery in Kentucky and the Southeast. He founded The Hope Initiative following the 2021 tornado in Mayfield, Kentucky, with a mission to point people to Christ while rebuilding lives and communities. He works closely with faith, nonprofit, business, and government partners in recovery efforts.



**LISA MATHEWS** is Executive Director of The Hope Initiative, where she leads long-term disaster recovery and home rebuilding efforts. She brings a strong commitment to collaboration, working alongside faith-based partners, volunteers, businesses, and local leaders. Lisa currently supports recovery efforts in Douglas, Georgia.



**AARON BYLER** serves on the Amish leadership team that helps guide the ongoing work of Northern Ohio Assisting Hands (NOAH). He lives in West Farmington, Ohio.



**LEANN LOVELL** founded Wynne Relief and Recovery after a tornado struck Wynne, Arkansas, in 2023. Through her leadership, volunteers mobilized quickly, and a large warehouse was established to coordinate donations and recovery efforts. She is a wife, mother of four, and grandmother of three.



**RHONDA ALEXANDER-MONKRES** is Executive Director of Ho'ōla iā Mauiakama Disaster Long-Term Recovery Group, coordinating recovery efforts following the 2023 Maui wildfires. She brings experience in nonprofit and disaster recovery leadership, previously serving with the American Red Cross. Her work focuses on collaboration, trust, and community-led recovery.



**LYNN COOPER** is an MDS homeowner from Juniata County and a mother of three. After the sudden loss of her husband, her family faced significant challenges, including critical home repairs. With support from her community and Mennonite Disaster Service volunteers, her home—and hope—were restored.

## Working together

From new homes to new bridges, from house repairs to wall hangings, MDS never works alone. During 2025, MDS worked more than ever with its partners.

The "Bridging Together" partnership between MDS and Lutheran Disaster Response came to full fruition, with volunteers building bridges crossing small creeks between the state-maintained roads and people's homes in western North Carolina.

What's more, MDS is now training others to build sound, tested bridges so that access—and hope—is moving even faster for residents affected by Hurricane Helene.

As MDS bridge coordinator Phil Helmuth said, "A bridge stands not only as a path over the water but as a symbol of shared hope, compassion and a community coming together."

In many other locations, from Alaska to Hawaii, Florida to Washington state, MDS has walked and worked together with long-term recovery committees, local churches, and local communities, building homes, building trust, and building partnerships that will stand the test of time—and the test of the next disaster.

Ultimately, working together is what helped volunteers build a new home for Lynn Cooper and her family in Port Royal, Pennsylvania. "We were surrounded by a lot of really good people," she said as her new home was dedicated.
